Happy New Year

At the start of yet another year it's truly a blessing to be in the company of dogs as they've always plenty to teach us and help us with. One of these things is helping us to get fit and reduce our stress a little. Dogs always need their exercise to keep in shape and if done with the right attitude this can also get us into shape as well.

Fitness and stress management are closely related, as regular exercise reduces anxiety and depression while also boosting levels of energy and 'feel-good' factor. This is as true for dogs as it is for us, only it leaves them with *less* energy to devote to destructive and undesirable behaviours, such as chewing, jumping, and barking.

Although the proper type and amount of exercise varies for each person and dog, the slightest bit can bring remarkable improvement in both mental and physical health. About 30 to 60 minutes of exercise per day is ideal for us and our dogs, but it's equally beneficial when separated into 10- or 15-minute increments. This is good news for those of us who are also working to improve our schedules and time management!

While you may not have a spare hour to set aside for fitness each day, you can find small bits of time that quickly add up. Maybe try waking up 15 minutes earlier than usual for a 10-minute walk with your best little friend. And if you've resolved to spend less time doing other things, such as household chores and watching television, the time that you've delegated to others or taken from an unproductive pastime can be put towards exercise and training with the dog. Documenting the time that you currently spend on various activities can also help you see where some spare time may be hiding.

It's important to remember with resolutions that drastic change does not occur overnight. Begin with small steps and be sure to reward yourself for every bit of improvement. This can help you hang onto the motivation you first felt, and before you know it, the benefits of the activity become the reward and motivation you once needed.

Why I'm the Right Choice to Groom your Dog!

A Look at the Old English

The Old English Sheepdog (OES) is also known as a 'bobtail' because of their short docked tails, which once signified that they were working dogs.

This large, fluffy breed has been around since the early 19th century and has quite a large fan club of devoted OES owners. Although these dogs may appear to be leisurely and perhaps clumsy due to their size and build, they are actually remarkably agile and energetic.

Bred to herd livestock, they love to round up other animals and objects, yet they easily train to do the jobs of other working class dogs. At home they are loving and intelligent companions.

Although their coats are long and thick, they are relatively easy to maintain with regular brushing and grooming. A full clip is sometimes necessary for severe mats or desired in certain climates, but their long coats do remain soft and mostly mat-free with routine care.

Reiki Healing for Dogs!

Reiki healing, which is a form of holistic energy work that originated in Tibet, is becoming increasingly popular among those who own or work with dogs. While this alternative treatment and relaxation method is typically used with people, it shows a lot of promise and benefits to animals.

Rather than being an invasive or stressful yet therapeutic procedure, Reiki is a gentle, hands-on approach to both physical and mental distress. The Reiki practitioner has learned to channel energy through their touch, which they then use to unblock or improve the flow of energy in their patient, thus facilitating the healing process.

A Reiki session promotes full-body relaxation in dogs. With a lower level of stress hormones, the dog's immune system can perform at greater levels to aid physical wellness. When dogs reach this state of relaxation they are also free from anxiety and other stressors that lead to behavioural problems. Dog owners can learn Reiki or take their dogs to trained practitioners for this.

A Lesson from Dogs: Living in the Present

While reflecting on the past and planning for the future this New Year, perhaps we could all take a lesson from our dogs and resolve to live in the present.

The concept of living in the present—or in the 'now'—is quite popular in both ancient and new-age spirituality teachings, including those from author Eckhart Tolle. The idea has only recently worked its way into the mainstream, and is something with which people often struggle at first, yet it's a healthy outlook that comes naturally to dogs.

Rather than dwelling on the past (which cannot be changed) or worrying over future outcomes (which cannot be predicted), you focus only on what is immediately before you. This requires a bit of practise, as the mind is naturally inclined to wander, but routine use of a present outlook can reduce anxiety significantly.

Living in the now not only helps us with stress management, it gives us greater perspective and leverage in dog psychology and training. Dogs focus only on what is immediately before them. And while past experiences can in fact shape their behaviours, they do not linger in the dog's mind.

When we train our own minds to view life from this perspective, we're better equipped to act appropriately with our dogs. We realise they're not even aware of *why* we're upset when we catch them after the act of doing something. We're also better able to handle them with confidence near people, places or things that were once associated with something negative.

As we promote this positivity in our own lives, we can, in turn, create stronger and healthier bonds with both our dogs and other people! Give it a go—you'll be pleasantly surprised how much happier you'll feel.

Teaching Old Tricks: Roll Over!

Exercise and cuddles are always in competition for the number one spot on a dog's list of favourite things. But second to that is the fun and satisfaction of practising and performing tricks. If you've some spare time after a walk or wish to work on obedience once your dog's relaxed, maybe try teaching or reviewing some old tricks like 'roll over'.

On a soft surface, entice your dog to lie down on their belly. You may need to get on the floor with them or hold a treat to the ground. Then, hold a treat near their nose but don't let them have it. Instead, carry the treat slightly up and over in the direction you'd like them to roll.

If your dog doesn't quite grasp the full motion at first, you may need to gently manoeuvre their body as you say 'roll over', and reward them with treats as they do it.

Once they understand the motion, however, it's important that you only give treat rewards intermittently. This teaches them to roll over on command rather than only doing it when there's promise of a biscuit.

Before long, your dog will love to show off their new trick to your family and friends and will be ready and eager to learn some more!

Winter Weather Paw Care!

Since we'll all be braving the cold and murky weather each day for a good walk with our best friends (we will be, right?), let's have a look at all the things we must keep an eye on for the health and comfort of our dogs' little paws.

Firstly, it really is important that their nails be kept short—or about as short as they'll go considering the length of their quicks. Lots of walking on pavement will help maintain this length, but they should still be trimmed and filed regularly. This prevents them from having aches in their legs and paws due to long or broken nails.

Also, especially if you'll be out walking in damp or snowy areas, it's good to keep the hair trimmed out from between their nails and paw pads. Otherwise, their paws can become traps for mats and other debris that can be painful and are sometimes difficult to remove.

An easy solution for keeping their paws clean and comfortable between grooming appointments is to wipe them with a damp cloth after walks. This removes dirt and road salts while also helping you keep an eye on the health of their paw pad skin.

If you notice any dryness or irritation, maybe try some paw pad moisturizer. And, of course, have them checked by a vet if the problem persists or appears severe. You can always put them in some doggie boots for snowy walks, too, though your dogs may not be too thrilled with that option!
