* If you plan to take your pet out of the country on your holiday, you'll need to ensure that certain 'DEFRA' regulations are complied with and that the correct certificates are obtained. You'll also have certain obligations to undertake when coming back into the country, such as having your dog treated for fleas, ticks and worms. Speak to your vet or go online to find out more about pet travel regulations.

* Increase their comfort by taking along familiar items, such as their bed or favourite toys.

* Remember to monitor the temperature in your vehicle, as the weather may be very warm on your journey. Don't ever leave your pet in a vehicle on a warm day, even when stopping for quick lunch on the way. The temperature inside your vehicle can soar quickly. As always, make sure they have plenty of water to drink on the journey.

* When you arrive at your destination, try not to let the excitement of the new place let you slip your guard with your pet. In unfamiliar surroundings, it's really important to closely monitor your dog so that he doesn't wander off and get lost.

Of course, one of the most important things to do is to have fun! So if you're off on your holidays in June, I really hope you have a great time.

My Dog Growls At Me When He's Eating!

If your dog snarls, growls or even snaps when you go close to him while he's eating, then you have a fairly serious problem. With this behaviour there is a clear dominance issue going on in your pet's mind. You can imagine it as being similar to a pack of wolves in the wild when they feed. The more dominant members of the pack get to eat first and if any lower members of the pack try to get close, they are growled and snapped at.

In your dog's case, they see everyone else as lesser members of their pack, so they claim the dominant position when eating.

While you may be careful around your dog when he's eating or even be ok with this behaviour, it's a problem that you really must address. Say a child or a visiting toddler unwittingly ventures too close while your dog is eating--the consequences could be very serious. But also, your dog is not in a happy relaxed state when he's eating like this. Wouldn't it be better to see him relaxed and happy when he's eating rather than gulping down his food while being tensely on guard all the time?

To help stop your dog from being territorial with his food, here are a few tips. But please note that when your dog is extremely aggressive and threatening physical harm toward you, you'll need to get advice from a reputable dog trainer.

- First of all, to show your dog that you are the dominant member of your pack you must "own" the food, so that he's only allowed to eat with your permission.

- To do this, command your dog to sit before placing the food down. If he tries to move toward the food without permission then physically block him (stand between him and the food). Keeping very calm but assertive, tell him to sit again. Depending on your dog's dominance and determination, this can take a lot of repetition.

- If your dog growls while he's eating, step between him and his bowl. It's so important that you don't snatch the food away from your dog as that creates a game and makes him pursue it more. Again, it's so important to remain calm but assertive during this training.

- Your dog may try to circle around you to get to the bowl, so to counteract this, just circle around with him while continuing to face him and blocking access to the bowl.

- If you have two or more dogs, make them sit before placing the food on the floor. You should then stand between them while they eat from their separate dishes. Carry out the above corrections if one becomes aggressive.

Over time when their behaviour improves, you can reduce the need to monitor them as they eat. But at any sign of this behaviour returning, repeat the corrective actions again.

Will Swine Flu affect my Pet?

All the recent media publicity and worry over Swine Flu has been centered on it affecting humans, but could our pets also be at risk from such a virus?

Well the good news is that at the time of writing this there is no evidence to suggest that Swine Flu will affect dogs or cats. So there's no need to worry just now.

While dogs and cats do have their own versions of influenza viruses, historically there never has been any known transmissions of these types of viruses from humans to dogs/cats or vice-versa.

But all viruses can change, so it's best to keep an eye on the news and, of course, if we hear anything we'll be sure to let you know.

Please note: If you happen to own a pet Ferret you may want to seek further advice. Ferrets are generally susceptible to human influenza viruses. Speak to your vet to get more information.

Mats! - Why Are They Such A Big Problem?

Mats are formed in your dog's coat when individual hairs tangle together. These tangles, if left un-brushed, tighten into thick knots that then become resistant to brushing.

Tangles in the hair can be caused by something as simple as the daily activities that your dog gets into. If the coat gets wet and muddy, or if debris such as little twigs, grass, grit or dirt gets into the hair, tangles can form. Even the way your dog lies down can be enough to tangle the fur in certain areas of his body.

Mats are more common on medium to longhaired dogs but thick undercoat on shorthaired dogs can also become matted. So what's the big problem? Surely, if mats form we can just brush them out—right? Well no, we can't because if the tangles have already formed into mats, it's too late as we've got to think about your dog's welfare!

When tangles form into mats, they become tighter and thicker over time. So if they're left, it becomes impossible to untangle the hair by pulling a comb or brush through the coat. If you then try to force the brush through the mats, you will simply be pulling on the remaining hair that is attached to your dog's skin.

Ask a friend to grab a small amount of hair on the side of your head and pull it as hard as they can—that's how mat pulling feels to a dog! While you shouldn't really have a friend do this, you can imagine how painful it would feel. By allowing mats to form in their coat, and then by trying to brush them out, it causes a lot of pain, which is just too cruel!

So what's the solution if the coat has become matted? If your dog's coat is already tightly matted, then in most cases, it requires the entire coat to be clipped off. At this stage there is really little choice as it's the kindest option for your pet.

However, the good news is that your dog's hair will grow back again. By taking the necessary steps to keep a coat tangle and mat free, you will be able to avoid full body clipping in the future!

Please note, however, that when allowing several months to pass without grooming or regular brushing, many dogs' coats become a matted mess. Some form into one solid pelt that resembles that of a sheep, which is painful and distressing for your dog. Mats tighten into the skin, thereby restricting movement and possibly making the dog unbearably warm.

Severe skin irritation, hair loss and other health issues are common with matted hair on dogs. Taking all precautions against hair matting is vital to the good health of your dog, which will surely please both you and your dog.

So how can you keep your dog's hair from becoming matted? Well, the key to keeping your dog's coat mat free is to straighten out the tangles before they form into mats! This requires regular brushing, sometimes as often as every day. But that's what it may take to ensure the knots come out!

Mats can form in very hard to reach areas, so daily care may require specialised brushes and technique. I'm happy to advise you on the correct tools and techniques, as I know that you, your dog, and certainly I will all be thrilled with a mat-free coat!

Keeping Your Pet's Teeth Clean!

You may not have realised it but pets can have dental problems too! Tartar and plaque can build up on your pet's teeth, just as it would on your own if they were not kept clean. This can lead to gum disease from which bacteria can lead to other more serious health issues.

If your pet's breath constantly smells bad, it's possible that they have a dental problem. Taking care of your pet's teeth is just as important as any other aspect of their health care.

One of the biggest effects on your pet's teeth is the food you are feeding them. In the wild, dog and cat teeth were naturally cleaned by the food they ate. The tough, fleshy fibers of other animals would "scrub" their teeth as they bit through hair and skin. This 'scrubbing' effect, combined with a high flow of saliva in their mouths, would help keep all the teeth clean and free from the build up of plaque.

However, in many manufactured pet foods there is no provision for this natural cleaning process. In fact, soft and sticky canned food can contribute greatly to the build up of plaque on your pet's teeth. So it's important to brush your pet's teeth regularly. When possible, try to do this no less than 3 times weekly.

There are various types of pet toothpastes available, which unlike human toothpaste, don't contain fluoride, can be safely swallowed by your pet and don't froth during brushing. You can also use a wet washcloth to scrub his teeth if you do not have any toothpaste available.

It's important to try to make brushing your pet's teeth fun for them, so start when they are young and make it enjoyable for them. This will make it much easier for you too.

Also try to provide your pet with the opportunity to create the natural teeth 'scrubbing' process. This can be done by giving them dental type chews or toys such as Kongs. As they chew and bite into these, the plaque will be naturally scrubbed off their teeth.

If you're in any doubt about your pet's dental hygiene, please speak to your vet.
